Ernest Hemingway was once asked how he felt about movies that were made from his books. His answer went something like this...imagine you are driving through Kansas on a long straight highway. In the distance, you see a car driving towards you. I often think of that quote when dropping our purchase orders into mail box. I thought, of course they would be a *bit sensitive* if their furniture arrived in less than perfect condition. I expected perhaps a scratch on the paint finish, or worse, a dent in one of the metal frames. Then we received the photographs.







To borrow words from my client's email (I couldn't say it better):

"Imagine buying a very poor quality cardboard box from Walmart or Target, putting a chair in a plastic bag with little pieces of cardboard wrapped around the legs, throwing it in the box with no packing material around it to keep it secure in the box and to protect the legs and basic frame, and then shipping it 3,000 miles Absolutely shocking, absurd and ridiculous!"
